

### DOUGH:

FILLING:

6 tbs. butter + 3 tbs. sugar

11/3 c. chopped walnuts

1 egg yolk

11/2 c. sifted powdered sugar 4 egg whites

1 c. sifted flour

1/2 tsp. almond extract Cream butter; add sugar, cream until light and fluffy. Add egg yolk and flour, blend smoothly. Chill one hour. Make filling by combining ingredients and beating until fluffy. Turn chilled dough out on lightly floured board; pinch off small pieces of dough. With lightly floured hands, pat dough into thin layer to fit lightly buttered tart or muffin tins. Fill 3/4 full with mixture. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes, until crust is golden brown. Cool, remove from tins. Makes 12-14 tarts.

## SJH Student Court, Safety Council Help Encourage Safe Driving Practices

Wishing to try out a new system for assisting students who violate school rules, St. James started a traffic court last year. The court, made up of the junior and senior members of the Student Council, try all the cases and hand down verdicts.

Traffic violations present the number of most frequent offenses that the court handled by the group. Running this court helps to cut down reckless and careless driving around school.

All monitors or Student Council members issue tickets to traffic violators. After violators receive this summons, they are taken to the Student Court which conducts itself on the pattern of the city traffic court. During the trial, students may say anything they want to defend themselves. Treatment of the offenders involves some form of detention, which varies according to the severity

of the violation and the attitude of the violator.

In addition to traffic offenses, the Student Court takes care of all students who disobey hall and cafeteria rules.
