Topples Jimmy Gridders; Revenge for Last Year's Defeat

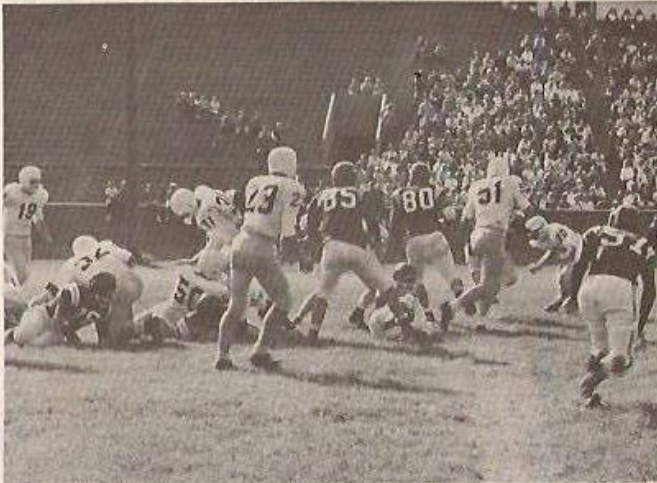
Two plays later, Bossoletti carried the ball to the 11 yard line for the first down.

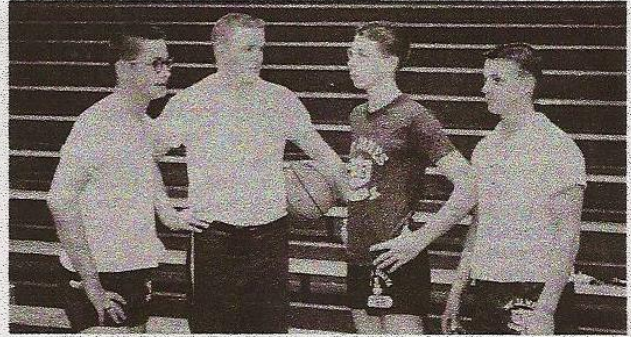
Practice for the 1961-62 basketball squad started November 7 when 35 boys reported.
